Santa Cruz County's Opioid Use






In collaboration with clinical providers, pharmacists, and local community champions, SafeRx Santa Cruz County actively works to turn the tide of the opioid epidemic by using evidence-based methods, including changing opioid prescribing practices and increasing access to Medication for Addiction Treatment (MAT). Unfortunately, our communities have not remained immune to the rise in overdoses nationwide from illicitly manufactured fentanyl. Provisional data from the CDC indicate there have been an estimated 107,622 drug overdose deaths in the United States during 2021. Bringing together regional partners, SafeRx Santa Cruz County is dedicated to counteracting this trend by promoting awareness of fentanyl and its dangers to our community, especially youth. We are also increasing our distribution of naloxone (Narcan®) - a life-saving overdose reversal medication - and we are in the initial phases of developing a mass overdose response plan.

What are opioids?

Opioids are natural and synthetic forms of opium widely used as pain relievers. Opioids include heroin, fentanyl and prescription medications such as morphine, hydrocodone (Vicodin® or Norco®), oxycodone (Percocet® or OxyContin®), codeine, and methadone.

Opioid use can lead to heightened tolerance, causing a person to take more of the medication to achieve the same pain relief. A person can develop tolerance even if opioids are prescribed and taken as directed. Consuming too many opioids can stop a person's breathing and lead to death.

How is SafeRx Santa Cruz County taking action?

SafeRx continues to update our locally published Prescriber Practice Guidelines biennially to reduce opioid prescriptions in our county. We have increased access to buprenorphine, an evidence-based medication for managing opioid withdrawal symptoms and cravings. And finally, SafeRx knows that enduring change cannot happen without equitably empowering our community – especially youth – with reliable information and resources. With this awareness, we regularly lead educational town halls, school presentations, and pop-up events in addition to maintaining a strong social media and website presence about the risks of fentanyl and steps they can take to reduce harm, including carrying and knowing how to administer Narcan®.
